"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds..." Romans 12:2

WHAT DOES "LOVING YOUR NEIGHBOR AS YOURSELF" LOOK LIKE?


Members of Farmington Lutheran have accepted the invitation to be "Congregational Caregivers." They participated in three brief training sessions. Some have volunteered to connect with other members via writing (yes, actually writing a card) to their two assigned people once a month. Others volunteered to make telephone calls twice a month to their two assigned people, while others said they would visit once a month one assigned person. Finally, two people volunteered to help with hospital or transitional care visits.

All of these 26 caregivers carry out the ministry of building connections and relationships. All of these caregivers are providing a caring ministry to people ranging from college students to seniors.

You are invited to share your time and skills as we recruit more people for this ongoing vital ministry. Our goal is to add ten more people to the team so that 20 more people can be supported, affirmed, and embraced by the Grace of God.

Forms should be submitted by March 11. Suggested donation is \$20 - \$25 per child. Donations go to help support the Senior High Mission Trip to West Virginia.



We continue to move forward toward a pastoral intern (student pastor) from Luther Seminary. Pastor Kevin will be interviewing potential candidates shortly. We won't know until April if the seminary assigns us an intern, but we are optimistic!

The intern would begin in August and be with us for a year. He or she would be able to do many of the duties of a pastor, and would be under the supervision of Pastor Kevin. Our task as a congregation would be to welcome the intern and teach the intern about life in the church. Traditionally, interns have had two years of classes, then go on internship for a year, and then go back to seminary for a final year of classes. However, with a growing number of nontraditional students (such as people who are second-career), we may get an intern who has gone to school for three years, and will spend their fourth and final year at the internship site.

- Continuing to be rooted in the Farmington community in a variety of ways.
- Creating inspiring stewardship processes.
- Reviewing the existing strategic plan and initiating a new cycle of planning.
- Strengthening ministry teams.
