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
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Jesus Calms the Storm: But that's Not the Point



That day when evening came, he said to his disciples, "Let us go over to the other side." Leaving the crowd behind, they took him along, just as he was, in the boat. There were also other boats with him. A furious squall came up, and the waves broke over the boat, so that it was nearly swamped. Jesus was in the stern, sleeping on a cushion. The disciples woke him and said to him, "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?" He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm.

Jesus did this, in part, to show His disciples His divinity. Several of the psalms talk about how only God can control the wind and the waves.

But He could have showed them that from the shore. He could have gathered his disciples around him on the shore during a storm, and then told the waves to be still. But He didn't. Why did He wait until He and the disciples were in the middle of the storm? Why did He make the disciples come and find him before he actually calmed the storm?

I think that's exactly the point Jesus was trying to get across: He wanted his disciples to find Him during the storm.

Yes, Jesus can calm our storms. But I think He wants us to see Him during the storm. If we think God's only value is to calm the storm, we miss the point. We need to see God during the storm—because sometimes the storm lasts a lot longer than we like. Seeing Jesus in the midst of the storm can calm us.





FARMINGTON MENTAL HEALTH ALLIANCE



Her first surgery was March 30 and she had eleven subsequent surgeries between then and the first week of June. During that time she developed stress ulcers, lost her eyesight, and a feeding tube was how she received her nourishment. I remember our pastor and friend visiting with us in Katie's hospital room. I asked him where was God during all of this? I remember his reply as if it was just yesterday that I heard it. Through tears he said, "God is here and crying with us." That was such a powerful reply.

In November of 1982, Katie went home to be with Jesus, I know He welcomed her with open arms.


Definitely uncertain times and God
